Lesson objective plans and cards from SSP for KS1 to deliver skills on "Fundamentals".

HQ PE lessons delivered by PE specialist with CPD support for year groups.

After school clubs actively engaging children from across the school.

Lunchtime clubs from the PE specialist to train for sports competitions.

Provide equipment and training to staff to lead active lunch clubs.

Sports competitions involving a wide variety of children across school.

Provide extracurricular activity to children who are not engaging in sport/activity within school.

Foundation clubs did not start this year as they usually commence after Easter.</p> <p>Dedicated places available for pupil premium children to ensure sport for all is available after School.</p> <p>Dedicated Premier Sport Coach came in to deliver a Dance lunch club that was attended by students who were either Pupil Premium or had not engaged with any other extra-curricular activities. A total of 45 children engaged with this club only, meaning that 45 previous inactive children became active.</p> <p>We sourced an external Netball Coach from MK Netters to work with our Year 5/6 children in a weekly afterschool club. This improved her teaching and therefore</p> <p>This included staff members attending RFU governing body courses and the Sudamerica Coaching "The future of coaching" conference.</p> <p>All course were shared with the relevant staff members to improve Sports delivery across the School.</p>                     |

| £798 Gymnastics Equipment - Classic Gym Mats + flat storage trolley  | <p>When teachers were surveyed about teaching indoor PE lessons, a common theme was that the lack of mats hindered the amount of time each child was active</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• We bought 8 x gym mats meaning that in any class there would be 2:1 child to mat. This increased the teaching time</li> <li>• The flat gym mat trolley has 2 benefits. Storing the mats flat means they are less likely to damage. It is also easier for the mats to be used from the flat trolley, again increasing activity time</li> </ul>           |
| <p>£200 League affiliation fees including:</p> <p>Cross Country, Boys football league x 2, Hockey League x 2</p> | <p>60 children represented the School across 3 cross country events.</p> <p>Entering 2 x boy's football teams into the MKPSFA league allowed us to have 4 teams in total represent Year 5/6. A total of 45 Year 5/6 boys played competitive football for the School between Oct - March.</p> <p>Entering 2 x Hockey Teams to the MKSSP League allowed 20 children to play competitive Hockey. For 18 of those children, this gave them the opportunity to play competitively in a Sport in which they do not have the opportunity to play outside of School.</p> |

The clubs were focused on trying to broaden the children's experience of sport/activity. The equipment was used in a variety of ways, for example we used the tags both for Tag Rugby but also Flag Football (non-contact NFL).</p> <p>A total of 230 (out of 360 KS2 children) children attended one or more of our active lunch sessions.</p>   |
| <p>£3482 Unspent Sports Premium money to be carried over to 2020/21</p>  | <p>Due to the enforced School's closure, we were unable to spend the entire Sports Premium Grant. Usually, money has to be spent in the allocated academic Year, but due to the exceptional circumstances of this academic year, Schools are allowed to carry this money forward into the next academic year.</p> <p>We were hoping to use the majority of this remaining allocation to upskill non-specialist PE staff with NGB gymnastics qualifications. These trained teachers would then take a more active role in delivering our Gymnastics curriculum.</p> |

**226 of 360 (62%) of KS2 children represented the School during the academic year of 2019/20. This is a drop of 17% on the previous academic year (286 of the 359 (79%) children on roll in KS2 represent the in 2018-19). We would have expected that we would have equalled if not surpassed these statistics if the School were to have been fully operational from March - July.**

341 children attended an extra-curricular club during 2019-20. Again this is a drop off of the 475 of the 630 (75%) who attended an extra-curricular club in 2018-19. Again, if the School was fully operational for the entire year, we would have expected to have had a far greater number of students accessing our extra-curricular offer.

The School Games Organisers suspended applications for the 2019-20 School Games Mark. Every School maintained their status from the previous year. This means that we maintained Gold status from the previous year but would not get a mark for 2019-20. We were hoping to have moved up to Platinum status, and to do so you needed to have 4 consecutive years at Gold - this would have been our 4<sup>th</sup> (our current participation and representation figures were already high enough to have secured the Gold Mark). We will be aiming to reach the Platinum Mark for the academic year 2020-21.
