89% of KS2 children represented the School during the academic year of 2021/22. This was achieved by the combination of entering multiple teams at sports festivals, organising sporting events with other local schools and inter class tournaments.

440 (70%) children attended an extra-curricular club during 2021/22. In every year group we had a significant rise in attendance. We arranged for a wider of clubs, organised for there to be multiple adults at clubs so that we could offer an increased number of spaces and funded free spaces for pupil premium children. Of the 70% who attended clubs, almost 90% of those children accessed more than one club.

Middleton have held a Gold School Games Mark for 5 consecutive years. This meant that we were eligible to apply for the Platinum accreditation this year. We are awaiting a response. The School Games Mark is awarded based on the participation in regular sport and activities as well as the breath of opportunities provided.
