Objectives in spending PPG:

2022/23 had a two pronged approach; to improve the level of teaching in statutory PE and offer opportunities without barriers for children to take part in extra-curricular sport.

This was done by:

CPD PE co-ordinator training.

CPD training for all teachers in progression of skills and core teaching points.

CPD ECT training.

Dance CPD

Use PE and sport as a tool to teach learning behaviours such as resilience, communication and self-organisation.

After school clubs actively engaging children from across the school.

Provide equipment for all classes/year groups to facilitate active lunch times.

Sports competitions involving a wide variety of children across school.

Provide extracurricular activity to children who are not engaging in sport/activity within school.

More children will meet PD Early Learning Goal and although there is no measure for this, most would exceed it.
	All children continued to receive high quality Gymnastics lessons. The scheme of work was followed and further adapted to suit the needs of children. This was monitored by learning walks, pupil voice and a working group of specially trained teachers.
	A new progressive Dance curriculum was implemented and teachers attended an online webinar with an expert teacher. Children's level of enjoyment and achievement increased

(pupil voice/summative assessment). By using the scheme of work, there was a structured plan for children to explore movement through dance and many opportunities for children to use subject specific language.

All of the above is measured by PE leadership with the assistance of the School Sports Partnership whose Silver Package we buy into. They come into school twice a year for a 'shallow dive' with the PE co coordinator.

We took 24 children who could not swim 25m by the end of Year 4. They were given the opportunity to have swimming lessons again to be able to swim 25m up until they left us at the end of Year 6. In Year 6, 76 out of 90 children completed 25m.

Each half term we presented a 'Sports personality award' for each KS2 year group. Award is effort and attitude based, not based on sporting competence. Children are motivated by this, appreciate their friends, the award and ask questions around what they can do to be in contention to win next time.

Extra-Curricular Sport £5368

Including:

- Various competition entrance fees
- Purchase of equipment so that we could host events including goals, kit and medals

We purchased goals and football kit so throughout the academic year, both girls and boys from KS2 had access to competitive football matches. We hosted a Year 5/6 league and tournaments for development sides as well as attending competitive leagues in all year groups. Over 150 children

- Purchase of items (e.g. shin pads) so opportunity was open to all
- Paid for free club spaces

played football competitively in this academic year.

Across the broad range of Sports offered to our children, in KS2 266 children (74%) had represented the school in a competitive sports fixture. Across the Year we won at both Milton Keynes and county level, won Year 3/4 Basketball, Year 3/4 Swimming and Year 5/6 Tennis competitions.

We pay for a specialist Netball teacher to deliver a weekly club to Year 5/6 as we do not have the expertise needed within school. Over the academic year 35 children have accessed this.

Overall, 393 children at Middleton (63%) accessed a sports club. There were sharp rises in up take in Foundation and Year 1 clubs in particular.

We received the Platinum School for Games Mark Sporting opportunities in the previous academic year (confirmation of this is sent at the beginning of the following academic year, this is why mentioned) and with the above figures, the broad opportunities provided and given most of the children who access Sport do so multiple times across the year.

Upgrading of PE and lunchtime stock £.2456

Including:

• Upgraded Cricket equipment

At Middleton, we encourage active lunchtimes. We have designated areas for Football, ball games/Basketball and a skipping section.

- Replacement Basketballs, footballs and skipping ropes (lunchtime)
- Specialist athletics equipment (discus/shot putts)

We bought equipment to keep the stock high here. The stock includes different sized balls which are age appropriate.

The impact of this is more children are active than inactive at lunchtimes. Some children who were previously unable to skip have been given the opportunity to practice and are now competent skippers. Children enjoy the freedom to play semi structured games amongst each other.

Children in all Year groups had access to age appropriate Athletics throwing equipment. We noticed post pandemic that children were less able to throw than previously, so the purchase is part of a long term strategy to improve this. The impact of this is long term, 75% of sports played in secondary school require throwing. Children being able to throw increases their chance of remain physically active.

Foundation personal development equipment £.902

Balance bikes

We purchased balance bikes for Foundation to help with the Physical development ELG. Not all of the children in Foundation have access to a bike so it provides opportunity to those who don't.

The impact of this is that children who did not have opportunity to ride a bike, now do. Foundation staff members are also able to monitor who cannot ride a bike and assist these children with learning to.
